# The Pastor's Pen



I used to visit a chiropractor regularly in Pittsburgh, and I got to know him on a less-than-professional basis. In fact, he graduated from Life University just north of Atlanta, and was envious of me moving here when I told him.

During one of my visits, he told me about a conference he attended in Toronto with 700 other chiropractors. The keynote speaker asked all those who had practiced for more than 15 years to stand up. About 150 doctors did. The keynote speaker then asked them to consider the numbers of patients they served over the years, and how many of them died from heart problems or cancer. Each chiropractor standing could think of several patients who did. Many of them were not regular visitors, and thus could not receive as many adjustments as they probably needed for better health.

My chiropractor reflected on that moment on his way back home, and he realized how important his work was for the well-being of his patients. Monthly adjustments not only relax muscles but also relax organs in the body and promote vitality. He decided to do everything he could to spread that message. He asked his patients to tell people about his work and how it helped with the restoration of the body. As he worked on me that day, he was genuinely fired up about everything he did in his office.

As I drove home, I had the chance to reflect on our conversation. My doctor believed the message he heard in Toronto. He believed in the message without wavering. Many of us might have a problem with chiropractics. Does "cracking" one's neck really help a person with neck problems, or are these chiropractors a bunch of charlatans? My chiropractor wasn't affected by the stigma: his belief in the message would not make him waver, because his convictions told him that chiropractics is a legit form of medicine which can restore health. And so, he spread the message and asked others to do likewise.

Quite frankly, the message about Jesus Christ and his salvation is better than the message my chiropractor wanted to share, but do we act like my doctor in sharing the message? Do we believe in the message about Jesus, or is there a bit of wavering or doubting going on inside us? Do we share the message, despite what people may think?

Listen to what John said in his letter: "That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked upon, and our hands have handled, concerning the word of God – the life was manifested, and we have seen, and bear witness and declare to you that eternal life which was manifested to us – that which we have seen and heard we declare to you, that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with His Son Jesus Christ. And these things we write to you that your joy may be full" (1 John 1:1-4).

One guy was called by Jesus to follow him. He heard and saw what Jesus did, so he decided to get the message out to others. He wanted others to be affected by the words of the Savior he heard. He wanted them to grow into better health – the health of eternal life – just as he had grown. Nothing kept John from sharing that message, even when he was exiled to an island to live out the rest of his days. He shared the message, so people would have fellowship with him and with God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, *and* so their joy may be full just as John's joy was.

One chiropractor's motivation should make us consider our motivation. Christ motivates us. Christ goes along with us. We not only believe but also live the message he shared with our whole lives. Others hear, and we hope they may believe, and see how Christ goes with them.
